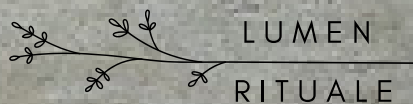

Sage

Salvia officinalis

About This Herb

Sage has a long history in both herbalism and folk magic, valued for its cleansing, protective and wisdom-enhancing qualities. Throughout Europe, common sage was traditionally burned, carried or hung in the home to help dispel unwanted influences and create a sense of balance. Today, it remains one of the most widely used herbs in magical practice, particularly for spiritual cleansing, preparing sacred space and beginning rituals with clear intention. While white sage has become popular in modern spirituality, common garden sage is an excellent and more sustainable choice for everyday practice.

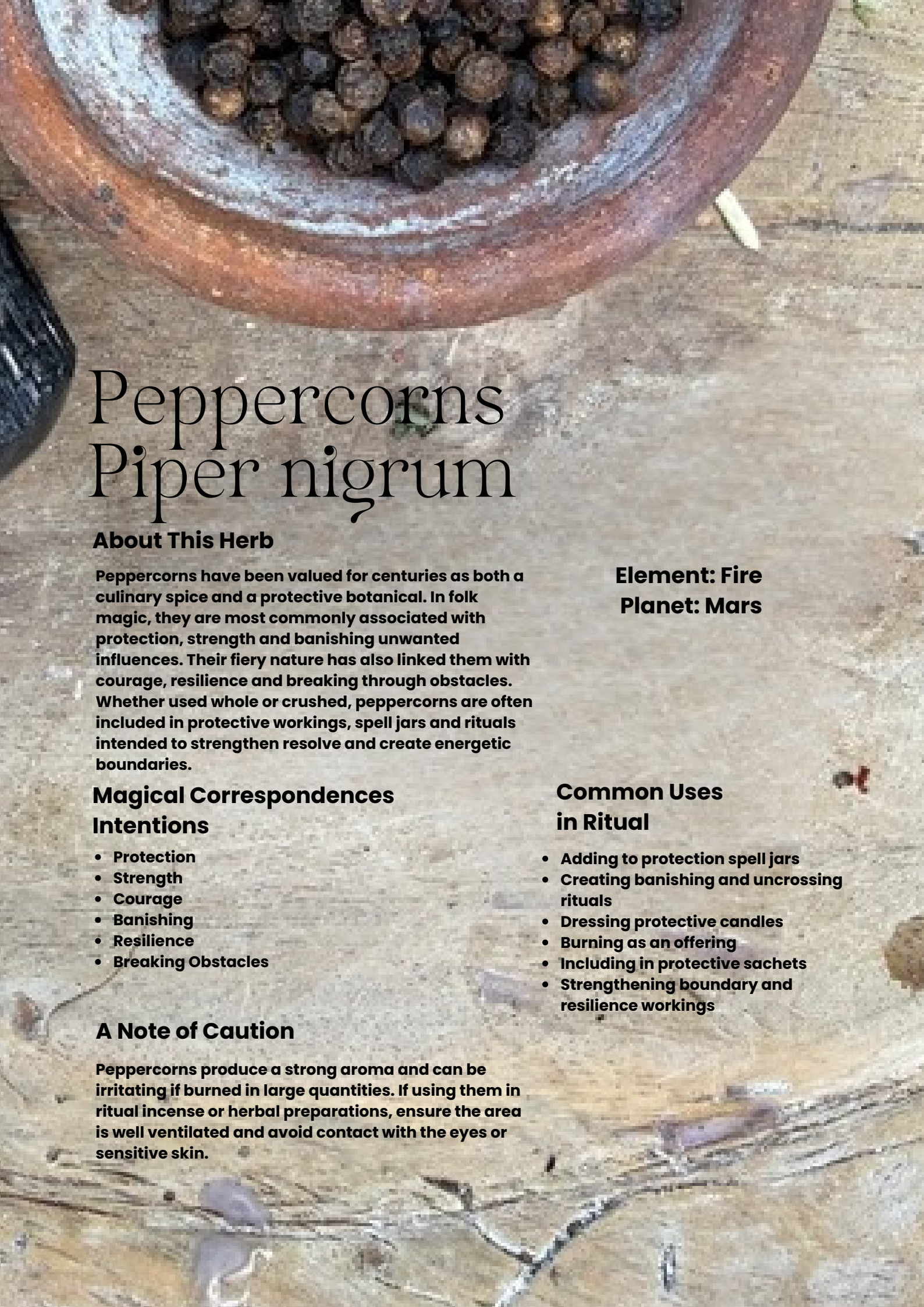

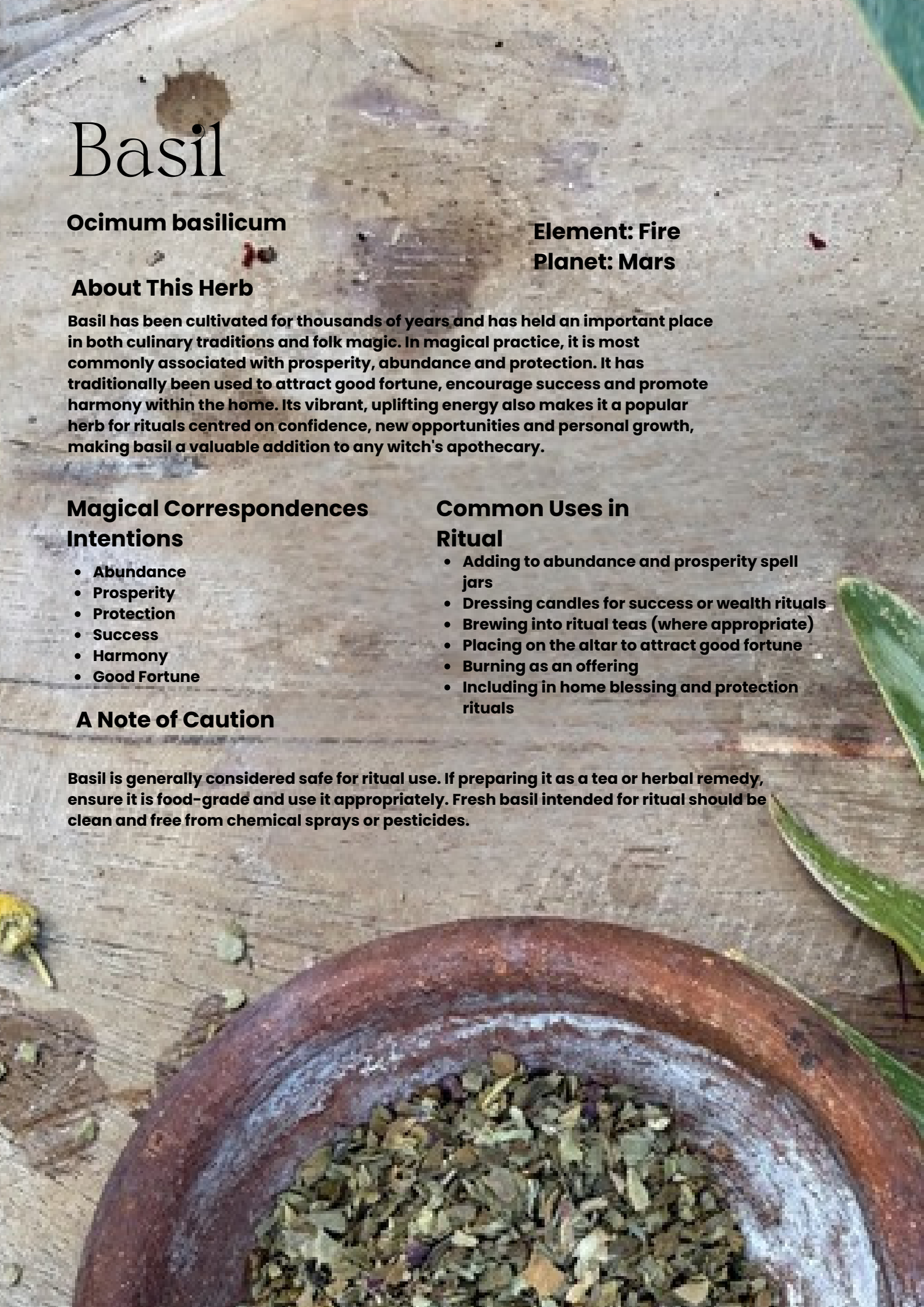

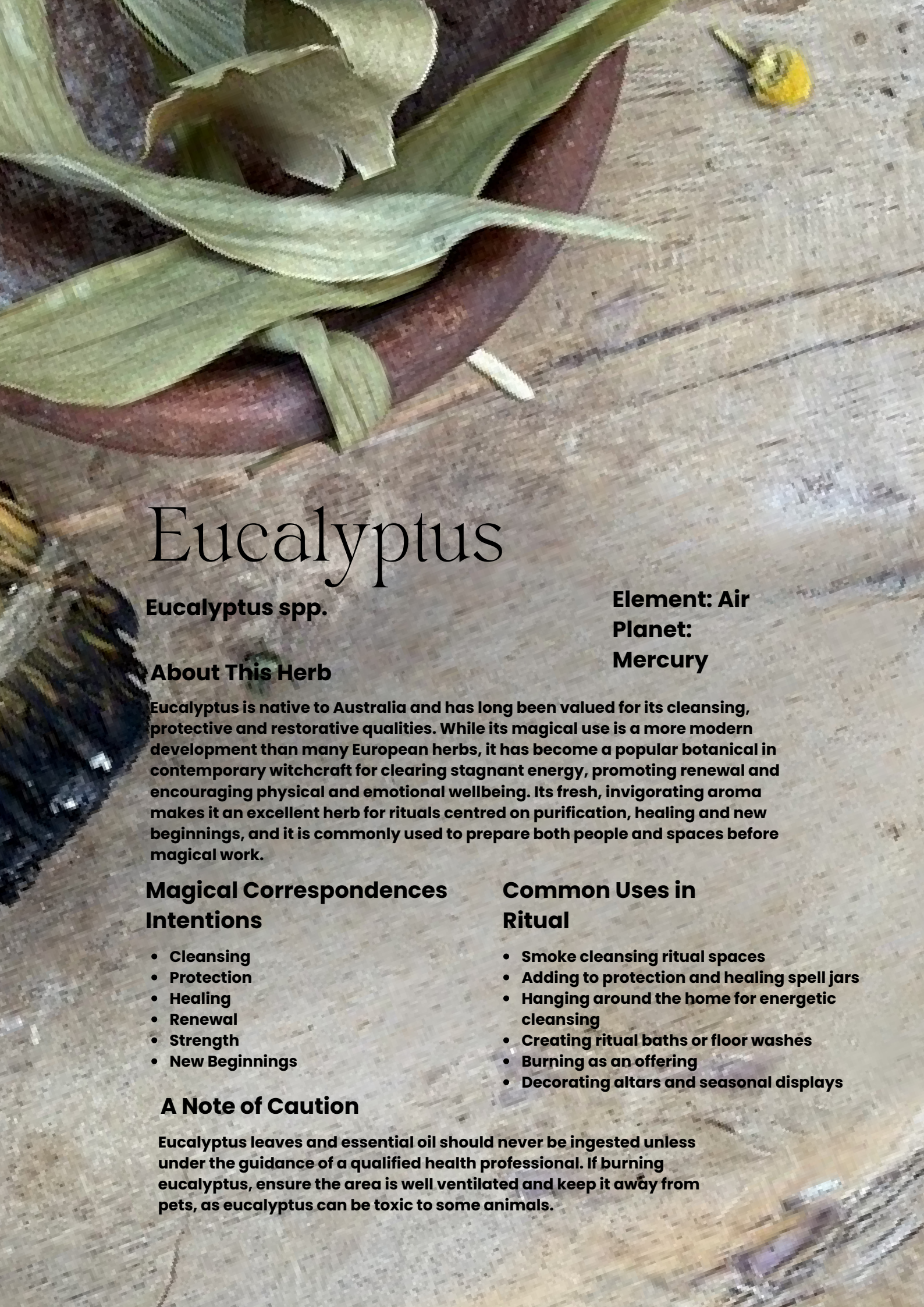
